Accessibility across UK & IE Universities

Introduction

Digital accessibility regulation is challenging to manage and is negatively impacting those for whom the rules should be assisting. Public sector bodies must deal with accessibility, against a timetable.

Now with a specific timeline in relation to the public sector achieving accessibility compliance for their websites, we have summarised our Q1 / 2020 results, reporting the position across the sector.



In Summary.

For the Sitemorse 2020 Q1 UK & IE Universities INDEX we assessed over 215 university websites for adherence to WCAG 2.1. The INDEX was compiled following some 220 million tests, checks and measures across nearly 675,000 URLs.

Comparing the 2020 Q1 to the 2019 Q4 results; 16 improved, 20 dropped, with the balance remaining the same.

The highest score for accessibility was 9 (out of 10), achieved by University of Derby with only one other university scoring 7 or higher.







It is important to note that this score is for automated tests; there are still manual tests that need to be performed however, a score of 10 demonstrates a thorough understanding of what needs to be done and it is highly likely that the manual tests will pass too.

It's important to note that the INDEX covers the main website of each university. The law applies to all websites operated, directly or on behalf of the university.

- Pages passing accessibility level A: 1.5%
- Pages passing accessibility level AA: 55%





What are the Regulations?

The EU Directive on the accessibility of public sector websites and mobile apps *(Directive (EU) 2016/2102 using European standard EN 301 549 V1.1.2 (2015-04)), came into force for in the UK on 23 September 2018. The aim of the regulations is to ensure public sector websites and mobile apps can be used by as many people as possible.

The Directive lists 3 dates for compliance to be achieved:

- 22 September 2019
 - New public sector websites (those published after 22 September 2018)
- 22 September 2020
 - All other public sector websites
- 22 June 2021
 - Public sector mobile apps

Clarification from the Cabinet Office:

"...any new content published after 23 September 2019 should be in an accessible format at the time of publishing."

PDF documents.

Along with the compliance assessment of web pages, we also reviewed the PDF documents from each university's website.


In total there were 1,879 PDF's assessed of which 11% passed all our WCAG accessibility checks.

Two of the most common actions required to improve levels of compliance;

- Content Tagging
- Document Titles

Ensuring accessible documents is an increasingly challenging task for public sector bodies, as it introduces new work procedures and requires extra attention during document creation.

The key to solving this challenge is supplying end users with tools that minimises the added workload and are easily adopted. We have found one such tool to be **accessibility**fixer by ¹dania software, which is covered later in this report.



PDF management.

The *regulation has allowances for historic PDF documents. The full text of the regulation can be viewed online, in relation to PDF's;

Citation and commencement 1.—

- (1) These Regulations may be cited as the Public Sector Bodies (Websites and Mobile Applications) (No. 2) Accessibility Regulations 2018.
- (2) These Regulations come into force on 23rd September 2018.

Revocation 2


The Public Sector Bodies (Websites and Mobile Applications) Accessibility Regulations 2018(1) are revoked.

Application 4.-

- (2) These Regulations do not apply to the following content of a website or mobile application of a public sector body—
 - (a) <u>office file formats</u> published before 23rd September 2018, unless such content is needed for active administrative processes relating to the tasks performed by the public sector body;
- (3) In this regulation—
 - (a) "archives" means a website or mobile application which—
 - (i) only contains content that is not needed for active administrative processes; and
 - (ii) is not updated or edited after 23rd September 2019;

.

(d) "office file formats" means a document in a format that is not intended primarily for use on the web and that is included in web pages, such as Adobe Portable Document Format, Microsoft Office documents or their open-source equivalents.




"standard" has the meaning set out in Article 2(1) of **Regulation (EU) No 1025/2012 of the European Parliament and of the Council on European standardisation
